On the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, we celebrate our Independence Day. It is time where we

reflect on our founding, the history of our great nation. Yet out of this reflection, this year I was left with a lingering thought: how do my rights as a Christian interact with the concept of rights as an American citizen?

As an American citizen, I have more than a few rights. In fact, we have a list of them called the Bill of Rights. These rights form the backbone of our society. We have religious free, freedom to assemble, and a whole host of others. The bill of rights is like the 10 commandments of our nation. Whereas the 10 commandments gave us godly requirements, the Bill of Rights gives us a list of rights that are ensured. These rights protect us from government overreach or usurping of our freedoms.

As Americans we often define ourselves by our rights. Entitled to these rights by our Constitution we believe nothing should prevent us from exercising these rights. Being an American is all about the security and protection of our own rights. In fact, many of the contemporary issues that plague American society steam in part from a desire to extend our "rights" into new untapped areas. Issues like abortion, homosexual marriage, and euthanasia all claim new rights for Americans. In many ways the unifying "American" identity across political, racial, and economic lines is the preservation of "our rights." Our rights are a wonderfully unique component of American representative democracy. Nearly no other nation in history or around the world today strives, or even

claims, to uphold the individual rights of their citizens like the United States of America.

As Christians we have access to an entirely different type of rights. We have the right to call God our father, the rights as a first-born son and all the privileges that come with it. Paul the man who wrote more of the Bible than anyone short of Moses wrote that giving up our rights for other Christians is godly. In 1 Corinthians 8 Paul writes that it is acceptable to eat food offered to idols, but that some Christians should give up this right to make peace with others.

One of the most incredible aspects of Christianity for us Americans is surrendering our rights. It is hard for us to understand and even harder for us to practice. Yet Paul writes extensively in 1 Corinthians 9 on just that subject: "Nevertheless, we have not made use of this right, but we endure anything rather than put an obstacle in the way of the gospel of Christ." That means our rights as Americans are secondary to our rights as Christians. I am not saying we should never share our opinions or let our rights as citizens be constantly trampled, but that our duty is first to Christ.

This idea works itself out practically through our individual interactions and our treatment of each other. Rather than consistently and constantly insisting on our own way, we should seek to humbly serve one another. Embodying this attitude of meekness creates a Christian community that is infectious; the more we humbly give up some of our rights, the more other Christians want to be a part of it. The more the church acts differently than the rest of the world, the more the world wants to be a part of it. I pray we that each and every one of us would pursue this virtue more and more; that we might develop the humility of Christ.

My mom recently sent me my copy of one of my favorite books, *The Federalist Papers*. The *Federalist Papers* were a series of essays written by John Jay, Alexander Hamilton and James Madison defending the new U.S. Constitution. I was recently rereading one of my favorites *Federalist 51*, where James Madison says:

"It may be a reflection on human nature, that such devices should be necessary to control the abuses of government. But what is government itself, but the greatest of all reflections on human nature? If men were angels, no government would be necessary. If angels were to govern men, neither external nor internal controls on government would be necessary."

Madison is making the argument in this section, that there is a need for a Federal Government with checks and balances because of human nature and he goes on to make the argument that we need some government simply because of who men are. What this caused me to do is ask the question: "what does that tell us of human nature?" What I believe here, is that Madison to some degree has a Christian understanding of what human nature is. Maybe not the full scope of what is understood in a Christian worldview, but a realization that human nature is messed up, we have a natural bent towards sin. It's from this perspective that we can start realizing our desperate need for a Savior, and it's from this position we can realize how good of one we have in Jesus. So this isn't to say that all one needs to know is that human nature is messed up, but when we really

understand how messed up we are, we really see the beauty of the savior to a fuller extent. Wil Lowery
