










#### Faith—Jesus Revolution

I had originally planned to publish a person's faith story but decided this past weekend that I wanted to publish something else this month. Many of you are aware of the new movie...Jesus Revolution. I thought it would be important to look at the movement which sparked the revolution and look at how the movie could impact our country today.

The movie essentially describes the time when a minister named Chuck Smith presided over a traditional church named Calvary Chapel.
